Sequencing

Hey guys, let's talk about sequencing Sometimes when you read something or write something, there's a series of steps involved

And those steps go in a certain order That order is called a sequence Sequences often occur in stories

or when giving instructions on how to do something

For example, if I were to give you instructions on how to make a

peanut butter and jelly sandwich, I would say...

First, you go to the pantry and you get two slices of bread

Next, you get some peanut butter and you spread it on one of them

Then, you take the jelly and you put it on the other one

Last, you put the slices together and your sandwich is done

"First", "next", "then", and "last" are sequencing words like "finally" and "after that" they tell you the order Because some things happen in steps and you gotta line them all up just right for the sequence to make sense and to keep it all organized

So those are sequencing words, and they can help emphasize the order of events "First" you do this, "next" you do that, "after that" you do this, etc.

You'll want to use words like these if you're giving step by step instructions,

but also if you're writing a story with a timeline of events.

Listen to how I use sequencing words to tell you the story of my morning routine...

First, I hear my alarm clock, and I wake up from a deep sleep

Next, I go to the bathroom, and I proceed to brush my teeth

Then, l'eat breakfast, until l'can't eat any more

Last, I get dressed and I comb my hair as I'm walking out the door

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So here's a question:

Do I eat breakfast before or after I brush my teeth?

Let's go back and look at the story.

Let's read the part about brushing my teeth, and the part about eating breakfast, and use our sequencing words to determine the order in which these things occur.

"Next [in this case meaning after waking up], I go to the bathroom and brush my teeth. Then, I eat breakfast..."

Our sequencing word "then" is telling us that I eat breakfast AFTER I brush my teeth. Or in other words, "I brush my teeth, THEN I eat breakfast."

Which is what dentists recommend, even if your Corn Flakes sometimes taste like toothpaste.

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
